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### i2010 – A European Information Society for Growth and Employment - Context

- ➤ Information and Communication Technologies (ICT) are powerful drivers for growth and employment.
- Approximately a quarter of EU GDP growth and 40% of productivity growth is due to ICT.

- ICT services and skills, media and content are a growing part of the economy and the rapidly emerging knowledgebased Information Society.
- Proactive policies are needed to respond to the fundamental changes in technology.





#### i2010 – A European Information Society for Growth and Employment - <u>Aims</u>

- ≥ i2010 European Information Society 2010 promotes an open and competitive digital economy where ICT is seen as a driver for inclusion and quality of life.
  - The completion of a Single European Information
     Space which promotes an open and competitive internal market for information society and media.
  - Strengthening Innovation and Investment in ICT research to promote growth and more and better jobs.
  - Achieving an Inclusive European Information Society that promotes growth and jobs in a manner that is consistent with sustainable development and that prioritises better public services and quality of life.





### i2010 – A European Information Society for Growth and Employment – <u>Objectives</u>

- A key element of the renewed partnership for growth and jobs.
- > Building an integrated approach to information society and audio-visual media in the EU.
- Objective 1: A single European Information Space offering affordable and secure high bandwidth communications, rich and diverse content and digital services.
- Objective 2: World class performance in research and innovation in ICT by closing the gap with Europe's leading competitors.
- Objective 3: An Information Society that is inclusive, provides high quality public services and promotes quality of life.





# i2010 – A European Information Society for Growth and Employment – The way forward

- ▶ i2010 is an important initiative for making Europe more attractive to investments in innovation and knowledgebased goods and services.
- The European Commission will continue to push for developing a consistent regulatory framework, covering networks, media, content and services which will exploit to the full the internal market.
- Using the community financial instrument to stimulate investment in strategic research and to overcome bottlenecks to widespread ICT innovation.
- Supporting policies to address elnclusion and quality of life.





#### i2010 – A European Information Society for Growth and Employment – <u>Conclusions</u>

- Knowledge accumulated through investment in Research and Development, innovation and education is a key driver for long term growth.
- ➤ A key challenge is to put in place the right framework conditions, instruments and incentives for companies to invest in research and new technologies.

With i2010, the Commission launches a new integrated Information Society policy approach. Fully in-line with the new governance cycle of the re-launched Lisbon Strategy, i2010 will contribute to the core of the Lisbon goal of sustained growth and jobs.





#### i2010 – A European Information Society for Growth and Employment – <u>Conclusions</u>

- The EU needs a comprehensive and holistic strategy to spur on the growth of the lct sector and the diffusion of ICT in all parts of the economy.
- The focus on Knowledge and Innovation in the Renewed Lisbon Agenda is based on the recognition of the driving role that ICT plays.
- ➤ There is a pressing need for continuously exploiting the advantages that ICT spurs and striving for developing a receptive environment which encourages wide European ICT deployment and take up.

<u>i2010 is an important part of a new political agenda for stimulating European leadership.</u>
